

Stuart is the national Vice President for the Australian Society for Intellectual Disability (ASID). He presents regularly at national and international disability conferences.

David was diagnosed with Stickler's Syndrome, a condition inherited by their three sons. Andrew is legally blind and now lives independently with his family, while Matthew and Jonathan both live with profound autism and are supported in residential living.

For the past 50 years Jenny has dedicated her life to caring for her family, being to primary carer for David throughout his life. As well as deeply invloved in Matthew and Jonathan's lives, attending medical appointments, advocating through NDIS and ensuring they are supported as they navigate adulthood within supported living environments.

There have been continued opportunities for Greg and me to be involved in the community .
